

Congratulations to:

Martha Friendly (Childcare Resource and Research Unit) who has been honoured with a <u>key to the city of Toronto</u> for her dedication to families and the child care sector. Martha was also awarded a King Charles III Coronation medal for her contributions to child care for more than 50 years.



Leila Sarangi (Campaign 2000) received a King Charles III Coronation medal for her work in eliminating child and family poverty.

Rianne Mahon (Carleton University) has been honoured with the <u>Ursula Franklin Award in Gender Studies from the Royal Society of Canada</u>, for her research on the politics of childcare policy development and how governments and organizations are responding to women's rising labour force participation rates.

Kim de Laat (University of Waterloo) who has been awarded a SSHRC Insight Development grant with Erin Reid and **Andrea Doucet** to explore hybrid work arrangements and cognitive labour and the implications for gender inequality at work and home.

Vanessa Watts (McMaster University) who has been awarded \$2M from the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation and SSHRC to examine the experiences of Indigenous residents of the Mohawk Institute Residential School and the Hamilton Mountain Sanatorium.
