



### 1. EVENTS

## 2025 GreyNet International Conference

We collaborated with **The Vanier Institute of the Family** (Serena Danssen and Margo Hilbrecht) and presented a poster at the GreyNet International Conference in Pisa, Italy, May 7-9, 2025.

The Vanier Institute of the Family, a national think tank dedicated to advancing knowledge on families in Canada, is expanding its Resource Centre to provide an additional open access point for peer-reviewed and grey literature resources for the RC/W project. The poster, "Tackling the Metadata Challenge of Funding Attribution for Grey Literature Resources", explored how to accurately describe and reflect funding and authorship in metadata to enhance transparency, attribution, and discoverability of RC/W resources.



## Vanier Institute of the Family

On May 15<sup>th</sup>, 2025, **The Vanier Institute of the Family** held a workshop on Mothers' Return to Work after Childbirth: Mental Health and Family Wellbeing. **Lindsey McKay** (with **Andrea Doucet** and **Sophie Mathieu**) presented on "Parental Leave Inequity in Canada: A Potential Contributor to Post-Leave Parental Mental Health".



On May 22nd, 2025, **The Vanier Institute of the Family** partnered with the Department of Human Ecology at the University of Alberta to host the panel discussion "Who Is Family and Why Should We Care?". **Yue Qian** presented some stories that highlight the mismatch between what people think of family and what laws and public policy say about it.

### Congress 2025

We organized a panel at the <u>Congress of the Social Sciences and Humanities</u>/the <u>Canadian Sociological Association</u>, which was held in-person at George Brown College from May 30 – June 6, and virtually from June 9 – June 13. Our panel, <u>Social Impact Research on Canadian Care/Work Policies</u>, took place virtually on June 12 and was organized by **Lindsey McKay** and included four presentations:

# International Network on Leave Policies and Research (LP&R) Annual Seminar

On June 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> 2025, the <u>22<sup>nd</sup> International Network on Leave Policies</u> and Research Annual Seminar (LP&R) took place in Vilnius, Lithuania, at Vilnius University on the *Challenges of Leave Policies and Social Sustainability*. As **Andrea Doucet** is one of the co-coordinators of this Network, she and **Jennifer Turner** assisted with some of the organizing and logistics.

Lindsey McKay, Sophie Mathieu, and Andrea Doucet, with Youjin Choi, (Statistics Canada), presented a paper entitled *Parental Leave for Every Child:* A Canadian Case Study. Andrea Doucet also participated on a panel with Alison Koslowski (UCL, London), Ann-Zofie Duvander (Stockholm University and mid-Sweden University) and Mara Yerkes (Utrecht University) on a book project on sustainability and parental leave; this book is part of an international project, *Parental Leave Policies and Social Sustainability*, funded by the European Union's COST Cooperation in Science and Technology.

Several of our team members are part of the Canadian team of the LP&R. In addition to Andrea, the team includes longstanding members **Lindsey McKay, Sophie Mathieu**, and **Diane-Gabrielle Tremblay** and recently appointed Junior Member, **Kenya Thompson**. **Donna Lero** is now an Honorary member, a designation that was approved in Vilnius in June. **Rachael Pettigrew** (Associate Member) and **Natasha Stecy-Hildebrandt** (Junior Member) are the newest members of the team (just appointed in Vilnius).

The Work & Family Researchers Network next conference will take place from June 17-20 at Concordia University in Montréal, Québec. The theme is Centering Care Across the Life Course. ### 2. OUTPUTS

At the 2024 Work and Family Researchers Conference in Montréal, Québec, 20 leading scholars presented their most compelling ideas in the work-family field to create a series of "Big Ideas Talks". The presentations were filmed, and the Big Ideas video series has now been released.

Manlin Cai, Donna Lero, and Sylvia Fuller have published a policy brief with The Vanier Institute of the Family on Care/Work Policies for Managing Routine and Unpredictable Caregiving.

**Andrea Doucet, Eva Jewell**, and **Jessica Falk** have published an article in *The Sociological Review* entitled <u>Deep listening</u>, slow relationships, world-making: Indigenous and feminist ecological reflections on the Listening Guide and the Live Methods Manifesto.

**Martha Friendly** has published <u>a chapter</u> on early childhood education and care as a social determinant of health, in the book "Social Determinants of Health: Canadian Perspectives".

Martha Friendly and Susan Prentice published their chapter, <u>The Trudeau government's changing child care file: From "institutional daycare" to early learning and child care for all as a CRRU occasional paper.</u>

**Sophie Mathieu** published an Op Ed in Policy Options on women and the federal election.

Molly McCracken and **Susan Prentice** have published an opinion piece in *The Winnipeg Free Press* entitled <u>Greater public role in child care will accelerate gain.</u>

**Susan Prentice** has published an opinion piece with *The Brandon Sun* on <u>Developing Child Care for Brandon</u>

**Kenya Thompson** and Emma Willert have published <u>a chapter</u> on improving upon Quebec's childcare policy model in the Canada-wide Early Learning and Child Care Plan, in the book "Assessing Justin Trudeau's Minority Governments (2019–2025): Navigating Through 697 Promises in Times of Crisis"

Our team is also working on, or have submitted for peer review, several papers from the <u>Familydemic Survey</u> and the <u>Care/Work Portrait project</u> and we will share more about these publications in our next newsletter.
